# PROTOCOL FOR PUBLIC REPRESENTATION AT VIRTUAL MEETINGS

The existing protocol for public speaking has been adapted to apply in respect of virtual hearings under the Licensing Act 2003, the Gambling Act 2005, and Schedule 3 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 (as amended by the Policing and Crime Act 2009).

It has been amended in accordance with Article 16 of the Council's Constitution: Covid-19 Interim Decision Making Arrangements, and the requirements of The Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus) (Flexibility of Local Authority and Police and Crime Panel Meetings) (England and Wales) Regulations 2020.

This includes applications relating to the licensing of alcohol, regulated entertainment, late night refreshment, gambling, and sex establishments, Hackney Carriage and Private Hire vehicles, which are the responsibility of the Licensing Committee/Sub Committee to determine as set out in Part 3.3 of the Council's Constitution.

- 1. The Chair welcomes everyone, matters of general housekeeping are dealt with, notification that the hearing may be recorded for live and subsequent broadcast on the Council's website, reminder to switch mobile phones to silent, principles for managing formal skype meetings.
- 2. The Chair identifies all parties present and makes introductions.
- 3. Matters of general housekeeping are dealt with, notification that the hearing may be recorded for live and subsequent broadcast on the Council's website, reminder to switch mobile phones to silent.
- 4. All persons who have given notice of their intention to speak are identified.
- 5. Identify if any person who wishes to withdraw a representation or wishes not to speak
- 6. Chair explains proposed procedure and order of speaking for hearing as set out in Appendix A. All parties confirm agreement or make representations on procedure proposed.
- 7. Licensing Officer's report is presented.
- 8. Parties present their representations in the order agreed.
- 9. Parties who are speaking should not repeat the information which they have already given in writing in their representation. They will be able to expand on the written information given, provided the information remains relevant. Any addition information should be limited to the grounds of their representation(s). For example, if they are objecting on the grounds of Public Nuisance, then they should confine their comments to matters relating to Public Nuisance.
- 10. Members of the Licensing Committee or Sub Committee may ask questions after each representation and at the end of all representations. Parties, will be allowed to ask questions through the Chair.

- 11. Following representations, the parties will be given the opportunity to sum up. Party who spoke first to go last. The hearing will then conclude.
- 12. Members will deliberate in private with the clerk and legal representative as appropriate present.
- 13. The decision will be taken by the Committee and notification of the decision will be given within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held in accordance with the regulations. The notification of decision will include information about the right of appeal as appropriate.
- 14. The Legal Advisor will advise the parties of any right of appeal as appropriate at the conclusion of the hearing.

#### General points

- The hearing may be adjourned at any time at the discretion of the Members
- Members may amend the procedure at any time if they consider it to be in the public interest or in the interest of a fair hearing
- The Sub Committee may decide to conduct all or part of a hearing in non public session where it considers the public interest in doing so, outweighs the public interest in the hearing.
- The Chair may exclude any person from a hearing for being disruptive.
- Meetings of the Licensing Committee in public session are recorded by the Council for live and subsequent broadcast on its website.
- The hearing will take the form of a discussion.
- Only persons (or their representatives) who have made an application, are subject to an application or have submitted a written representation to the Licensing Authority under the relevant Act are permitted to speak at the hearing.
- Any further information to support an application or a representation must be submitted at least 5 working days prior to the Hearing. Any submissions submitted less than 24 hours before the hearing must be agreed by all parties at the Hearing, before it can be considered
- If a party has informed the Authority that he does not intend to participate, or be represented at the hearing, or has failed to advise whether he intends to participate or not, the hearing may proceed in his absence

For other matters in Part 3.3 of the Council's Constitution which are the responsibility of the Licensing Committee, the procedures set out in Appendix 6 of the Council's Constitution in relation to public questions, statements and petitions as amended by Article 16: Covid-19 Interim Decision Making Arrangements and the provisions in The Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus) (Flexibility of Local Authority and Police and Crime Panel Meetings) (England and Wales) Regulations 2020 shall apply.

This includes such matters as making recommendations on relevant policies, approving the level of fees charged by the Council, and making decisions on tariffs charged by the Public Carriage Trade.

	The current licence permitted off sales of alcohol only between the hours of 12:00 to 20:00, with permitted opening hours of 08:00 to 03:00, each day of the week.
	Variation is made to extend the permitted hours and allow the business to operate 24 hours, 7 days a week, for the supply of off sales of alcohol and to add late night refreshment between the hours of 23:00 and 05:00 each day.
	Current conditions 2.5 and 2.6 are requested to be amended and a number of additional conditions have been offered within the application to be imposed on the licence if granted.
	The premises also request approval of a new proposed layout plan to replace the current newspaper shelving with a new chiller unit within the licensed area.
Recommendations	It is RECOMMENDED that:

The premises is currently permitted to operate 24 hours a day 7 days a week. However, the opening hours stated on the current licence restrict the business. The application seeks to increase the opening hours in order to operate 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

In accordance with the Revised Section 182 Guidance, highlighted below the applicant requests the ability to also increase the times for the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises during the requested opening hours.

Guidance 10.15 – "Shops, stores and supermarkets should normally be free to provide sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises at any times when the retail outlet is open for shopping unless there are good reasons, based on the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours".

We submit – the premises has operated until 06:00 hours on Saturday's and 03:00 hours on other days without issue. The current conditions provide a good framework together with the excellent management procedures in place. The proposed conditions below also provide additional measures to promote the licensing objectives.

There is also a minor alteration to the approved plan. The attached plan now shows a chiller unit.

#### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Note – The past 18 months and the current climate has driven the need to revise our offering with the option to deliver food direct to the home 24 hours a day if necessary, which may include alcohol.

The provision of late night refreshment is to encourage individuals to consume food when purchasing alcohol over the counter.

The following condition is proposed –

• Between midnight and close the purchase of hot food such as a pie, or sausage roll must be purchased at the time of any service of alcohol.

Also, to increase security at the premises the following condition is proposed -

• The premises licence holder will carry out a risk assessment in relation to the engagement of SIA licensed staff. The findings of the risk assessment will be recorded and made available for inspection by Dorset Police or an authorised officer of the council.

To further increase security the following condition is also proposed -

• The premises licence holder will be a member of a local Town or Pub Watch scheme, to include use of a radio.

The following conditions are proposed for home delivery where alcohol is included in the purchase -

- The sale of alcohol to the home is only permitted where food is purchased at the same time.
- The purchase is by way of credit/debit card only where the request is made by electronic means e.g. website, facebook or by telephone.
- Where alcohol is delivered to the home it may only be supplied to the individual who made the purchase. The alcohol may not be supplied to another individual or left on site without first witnessing the correct I.D, which must be produced by the purchaser.
- Where no I.D is supplied by the purchaser in person the alcohol will be returned to the premises. A record of the incident will be logged to include the name of the purchaser and the delivery address together with a summary of the incident. This record will be made available to the responsible authorities upon request

- 1.1. There shall be no sale or supply of alcohol when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this premises licence or at a time when the said premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or when his/her licence is suspended.
- 1.2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

#### The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) (Amendment) Order 2014

1.3.

- 1. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- 2. The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- 3. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -
- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

### The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Conditions) Order 2014

1.4.

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 -
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula —

$$\mathsf{P} = \mathsf{D} + (\mathsf{D} \times \mathsf{V})$$

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

#### Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

#### Prevention of Crime & Disorder

- 2.1. The premises shall install and thereafter maintain in good working order a digital CCTV system. The system shall be in operation at all times the premises are open for business.
  - 2.1.1. Images shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days and shall record the time and date. Facilities will be made available to allow police and other authorised officers (as defined by the Licensing Act 2003) to view recordings on request and to be provided with copies of recordings in playable format on request, provided in each case that the request is compliant with Data Protection legislation.
  - 2.1.2. Whenever the premises are open, there will be at least one member of staff on duty or otherwise available at short notice capable of and authorised to access the CCTV system and trained to view playbacks and make recordings.
  - 2.1.3. If the CCTV system suffers any malfunction, the same shall be notified to the licensing authority as soon as reasonably practicable and rectified as soon as reasonably practicable.
- 2.2. No beer, lager or cider with an ABV of over 5.5% shall be stocked or made available for sale.
  - 2.2.1. Cider shall not be sold in bottles of any type that are larger than 1 litre in volume.
  - 2.2.2. Sales of canned beers, lagers and ciders shall be in a minimum quantity of 4 cans at a time.
- 2.3. A refusals register shall be maintained at the premises and used to record all occasions where a person is challenged to provide proof of age and either fails to do so or the proof shows that he/she is under age.
  - 2.3.1.A note shall be made of the date and time of the incident, a brief description of the person concerned (and his or her name if given), the goods the person was attempting to purchase and the name of the person dealing with the incident.
  - 2.3.2. The register shall be checked and signed at least weekly by the DPS or his/her deputy and shall be made available for inspection by any authorised officer (as defined by the Licensing Act 2003) at any time the premises are open to the public.

- 2.4. All staff shall receive training with regard to prohibited sales (age and to persons who are drunk), the conditions attached to the licence and on spotting and preventing proxy sales. Refresher training will be provided at least once annually.
  - 2.4.1. A record shall be made of all such training, signed by the person receiving the training and the record shall be made available for inspection by authorised persons (as defined by the Licensing Act).
- 2.5. All spirits and high value alcohol products such as champagne shall only be stored behind the sales counter and shall not be directly accessible to customers. All other alcohol shall be kept in cabinets with lockable "pull down" or other screens which shall be used at all times the premises are open but not licensed to sell alcohol.

2.5.1. Other than alcohol stored behind the sales counter, no alcohol shall be stored within 3 metres of the entrance to the premises.

- 2.6. Notices shall be displayed behind the sales counter and on any unit used to store alcohol clearly stating that "We are only licensed to sell alcohol between noon and 20:00 daily".
- 2.7. Notices advertising the "Challenge 25" policy shall be displayed at the entrance to the premises, behind the sales counter and on all units used for the storage of alcohol.
- 2.8. No notice of any description (other than signage required by law or by the licence conditions) shall be displayed on the frontage (including the entrance to the premises) advertising that alcohol products are for sale in the premises other than a single sign either stating or including the words "Off Licence".
- 2.9. All bottles and cans sold shall bear a label or other mark identifying the premises as having been the source of the product, provided that when cans of beer, lager or cider are sold in packs of four or more, only one can need be so marked.

#### Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 2.10. No deliveries shall be made to the premises before 07:00 any morning, other than milk, newspapers and bread products.
- 2.11. No rubbish shall be taken out of the premises for disposal between 23:00 and 07:00 daily.

I apologise for the delayed response to the Cc, we had to deal with a family issue in Stoke-On-Trent.

Thank you for your comments, which I have discussed with my client. The safety of staff is important to my client, who has operated in this location without incident until 06:00 hours. One of the additional conditions offered relates to a risk assessment approach to security. The safety of staff, together with the normal Health and Safety at Work etc Act 1974 and Health and Safety Risk Assessments carried out at this premises. Training in accordance with the findings of the risk assessment will be carried out and will cover the premises and delivery of alcohol with any order.

Should the risk assessment determine the need for roaming security, which operates in the town, or static security then of course this will secured. The use of a town watch radio is also offered along with membership of town watch, which will also increase security and the safety of staff. There may be a mixture of roaming and static security determined by the risk assessment. There will also be an assessment of the viability on certain evenings throughout the week and when special events happen in the town.

The history of this premises is excellent and they will continue to work in partnership with the authorities as they have done since taking over this business. They will continue to operate strict policies on the sale of age restricted products and to provide CCTV evidence when issues occur on the street as they have done in the past.

While I appreciate your comments about the area it is my clients responsibility to promote the licensing objectives for her premises, which she has done and will continue to do.

Should you have specific detrimental evidence I will of course be happy to receive it and address the issues with my client.   - i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
  - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours of less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can be reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 4. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried out in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -

- a) a holographic mark, or
- b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that -
  - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
    - i. beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
    - ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - iv. still wine in glass: 125 ml; and
  - b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
  - c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Living opposite the above premises requesting a variation to premises licence, I have to object for the following reasons:

- The premises (Splinters) is in a conservation area and the residential houses nearby are all Listed. Consequently we do not have adequate double glazing, only secondary, to minimise noise, particularly live and amplified music. Even now we suffer a high degree of noise pollution which, as I am sure you are aware can lead to disrupted sleep and stress. In hot weather bedroom windows have to be firmly closed to have any chance of sleep. There is no outside space available to customers of the above referenced premises and those wishing to smoke or just be outside, will spill out onto Church Street. This is not fair on homeowners.
- The cottages opposite are all over 500 years old and do not have deep foundations, in fact
  hardly any, therefore vibration comes through the cobbled road and pavement and the cottages
  opposite are subjected to a constant thump, possibly even causing structural damage. In
  addition, cars and taxis which come up to the Priory gates late at night collecting customers
  from venues turn round and drive over kerb stones which are loose and not maintained, this
  also adds to vibration and nuisance.
- Minor vandalism (or possibly accidents) to the residential properties has occurred in the past from intoxicated customers leaving late night venues, i.e. cracked or broken window panes and damage to window sills.
- There is only one late night license in Church Street and this is outside the Priory quarter, Splinters is not.
- I believe your Noise Assessment Review should determine that the Splinters premises are not suitable for live and amplified music or a late night license.

# Vibration comes through the cobbled road and pavement and the cottages opposite are subjected to constant thump, possible causing structural damage. In addition, cars and taxis which come up the Priorty gate late at night collecting customers from venues turn around and drive over the kerb stones which are loose and not maintained, this also adds to vibration.

We sympathise with this issue but unfortunately this is outside our control. The taxi rank is only a few metres away, and we will be directing all customers away from Church Street as they leave. Given the size of our premises, we do not expect any increase in vehicle movements on Church Street.

# Minor vandalism to the residential properties has occurred in the past from intoxicated customers leaving late night venues.

Regrettably we cannot be accountable for past issues, but we can provide assurances about the future. As previously mentioned, we will employ 2 SIA accredited door supervisors who

will be positioned at the front door on weekends. They will be employed until 30 minutes after closing time to ensure that Church Street is clear of any customers, thereby reducing the risk of vandalism.

Door supervisors will also work closely with Soho and other neighbouring premises to collectively maintain order in the town centre. This will be underpinned by our active engagement with the local Pubwatch scheme.

# There is only one late night licence in Church Street and this is outside the Priory quarter, Splinters is not.

The late-night economy in Christchurch is thriving. By midnight on a Friday and Saturday, there are long queues at the taxi rank and outside Soho, giving us confidence that there is demand for late night premises. Unlike the other premises, we will continue to offer a food menu until closing time, thereby reducing the risk of public nuisance and disorder.

By introducing a new late-night licence, there will be less people on the streets and more people inside premises under supervision. In our opinion this is positive.

My earlier comments, however, pertain in the main to the extended licensing hours request and as stated in the 2003 Act, the local licensing authority I believe has the power to make decisions regarding opening hours. This decision to be based on local knowledge and consultation with responsible authorities. I would hope that the views of residents who are likely to be affected by an extension to a license into the early hours of the morning for the majority of the week would by taken into consideration.

I cannot say that Mr Muirhead's response has given me much assurance particularly since his target market would appear to be drinkers from the pubs after closing time, all through the week. The ambience of the other licensed premises in Church Street, which in most cases do attract a mixed demographic, sits well within such an historic area and, on the whole, although at times with exceptions, the clientele do treat the area with deserved respect. A late night licence all through the week for a business within the Priory Quarter would not.

Thank you for your attention and I, along with my neighbours, await the outcome of your Assessment.

Dear R.B Hirsbrunner

Thank you for sharing feedback on our application to vary the premises licence for the. I acknowledge and appreciate the concerns you have and wish to provide assurance that our plans for the premises will see no deterioration in the enjoyment residents have living on Church Street.

We are currently undergoing refurbishment of the property, restoring some of the original features of The Castle Tea House. It is our intention to reopen as a tapas and cocktail restaurant that draws on the building's history as a tea room.

We are seeking to create a venue that offers something a little more grown-up, especially for those that does not want to frequent venues such as Soho or Camerons. Our target customers will primarily be families and tourists during the day, and a more mature customer base in the evening. Over time we have seen that there is demand for a late night venue that is perhaps less energetic than others!

Whilst we are proposing to add live and recorded music to our licence, this will be limited to background levels, similar to that you will have experienced with Splinters.

Only last week my partner and I visited venues in the town centre. By midnight our only option was Soho, Camerons or the taxi rank. What we believe is missing is a venue for those who want to socialise in a quiet and relaxed setting. This is what The Tea House will offer.

## **Splinters 11-12 Church Street - Variation Application**

I have looked at this application and have some serious concerns.

I understand you plan to use the premises as Restaurant / cocktail bar. The business will have live and recorded music, and is open until 2am at weekends. The business is a terrace property with residential properties attached both sides.

My concerns are mainly around the prevention of public nuisance.

Having looked at your Noise Management & Public Nuisance plan I would like to make the following observations and have the following questions.

- I am concerned about the noise transmission to next door (a residential premises) through the structure of the building. I suggest you need a <u>structural noise</u> <u>transmission survey</u> to ascertain what levels music can be played at in your business that do not cause a disturbance next door.
- I am pleased that you are putting in a sound limiting device. The level we are likely to set on this would be at a background music level until more is known about the noise transmission to neighbouring premises.
- The doors and windows should be closed after 23:00. I suggest this should be 21:00 when there is regulated entertainment. This should also be in place on a Friday and Saturday night when you have 2 x CIA staff on.
- You state Regulated entertainment must not exceed 74dB(A) from 1 metre at any boundary before 2300. I do not understand what you mean by this statement and therefore would not be willing to support this. Please could you clarify.
- You go on to state that Regulated entertainment must inaudible from 1 metre at any boundary after 2300. I would support this, but I don't think it is realistic or achievable.
- A <u>noise assessment</u> carried out by a competent acoustic engineer is required to give the council more reassurance that the building is suitable for such an operation.
- How do you plan to manage smoker at the front of the premise? They only seem to be able to go out the front of the premise to smoke. This will result in significant noise to local residents. I suggest that customers wanting to go outside to smoke should not be permitted to take their drinks. This way customers come back inside more quickly and don't loiter outside.
- Of the nearby licensed premises some are licensed until 2am or later. However, in practice, they generally close considerably earlier than this. I suggest that on a Friday and Saturday you should close earlier perhaps stopping selling alcohol at 12:30am with customers out by 1am as per your Sunday to Thursday times. This is to reduce the potential of noise nuisance caused be people coming and going from your premises.

Your application states you wish to agree the noise management plan with the local authority. Without more information we are unlikely to be able to agree it.

As the deadline for representation is Monday 13<sup>th</sup> September we have little time to discuss these issues. Therefore currently I am <u>objecting to this application</u>.

Please call me at your convenience although I am working out on site visits this afternoon.

We have great concerns regarding the extension of the new license that is described on the application for 11 Church Street and strongly oppose to any changes to the current license that 11 Church Street has for the following reasons.

- 1. 11 Church Street is situated in what is known as the Priory Quarter. There are double yellow lines and parking is not permitted, except for deliveries to the premises to this part of church street. There is a turning point by the Priory Gates. On many occasions the double yellow lines are ignored, cars are left on the street and are parked on the pavements and the doorways of the cottages are blocked. There will be an increase in traffic turning around in the street, with car doors being slammed late at night. This already happens now causing disturbances to the residents. We do not wish this to continue later into the night.
- 2. We are disturbed by late night music, shouting, car engines revving and doors slamming from Soho, which is further away from our premises at weekends. This results into the fact my daughter has to move into another bedroom and sleep on the floor with her sister or in our bedroom. This is totally unfair and unacceptable on her and could be classed as against her human rights. This could have an effect on all our mental health. This disturbance will only get worse and will happen all week if this licensing application goes through and will make the two bedrooms in front of our premises unusable due to the noise of the music, the influence of alcohol, especially at closing time, when those leaving will not have any consideration for the residence of church street. This is a conservation and residential area, not a night club area.
- 3. The music from Soho is bad enough at the weekends. The three buildings opposite 11 Church Street are grade 2 listed. They have no foundations and shake when the music gets loud.

It has proved very difficult to have the authorities to deal with the noise pollution and disturbance we suffer from Soho at the weekends. We certainly do not wish to have another premises closer to us open to the early hours 6 days a week

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# **CONDITIONS AGREED WITH DORSET POLICE**

- 1. The premises shall primarily operate as a restaurant.
- 2. CCTV will be in positioned inside the premises and the front facing in both directions of Church Street.
- 3. A CCTV system, shall be installed to cover all entry and exit points enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record and cover areas where alcohol is kept for selection and purchase by the public, whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. It shall operate during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31days with correct date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of police or an authorised officer of the council throughout the preceding 31 day period. The CCTV system shall be updated and maintained according to police recommendations.
- 4. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member must be able to show a police or authorised council officer recent data or footage with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
- 5. CCTV shall be downloaded on request of the police or authorised officer of the council. Appropriate signage advising customers of cctv being in operation, shall be prominently displayed in the premises.
- 6. A documented check of the CCTV shall be completed weekly to ensure all cameras remain operational and the 31 days storage for recordings is being maintained.
- 7. The premises shall maintain membership of the Townwatch scheme (or any successor scheme); a senior member of staff shall attend all Townwatch meetings unless an emergency arises preventing such attendance and the premises will support Townwatch initiatives.
- 8. All staff working at the premises concerned with the sale of alcohol shall be trained in accordance with an accredited training scheme on the law relating to prohibited sales, the age verification policy adopted by the premises and the conditions attaching to the premises licence. Refresher training shall be provided at least once every 6 months. A record shall be maintained of all staff training and that record shall be signed by the person receiving the training and the trainer. The records shall be kept for a minimum of 12 months and made available for inspection by police, licensing or other authorised officers.
- 9. An incident log shall be kept at the premises. The log shall include the date and time of the incident and the name of the member of staff who has been involved. And made available on request to an authorised officer of the council or the police, which shall record the following:
- (a) any complaints received
- (b) any incidents of disorder

- (c) any faults in the cctv system / or searching equipment / or scanning equipment
- (d) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
- (e) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service
- (f) all crimes reported to the venue
- (g) all ejections of patrons
- (h) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons

This log to be checked on a weekly basis by the DPS of the premises.

- 10. Challenge 25, shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are (recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence or passport or holographically marked pass scheme identification cards). Appropriate signage advising customers of the policy shall prominently displayed in the premises.
- 11. SIA two door supervisors shall be provided from 2100 on Friday and Saturday until last customers have dispersed from the immediate vicinity of the premises.
- 12. At all other times the DPS shall risk assess the need for door supervision. Door supervisors shall be provided in such numbers, between such times and on such dates as required by the risk assessment which shall be made available for inspection by a responsible authority.
- 13. We shall impose a 100% id policy on Friday and Saturday nights from 2100.
- 14. Dispersal policy shall be a working document which will be subject to regular review and consultation with responsible authorities.
- 15. Routine checks of customers on arrival and throughout the evening to deter and minimise the risk of drugs and weapons being brought into the premises.
- 16. Hourly checks of the toilet area shall take place, including drug swabs of flat surfaces, these checks to be documented.
- 17. We shall actively promote 'Ask Angela', and have leaflets available to customers for Turning Point and Drink Aware.
- 18. We will operate in line with the noise management plan as approved by the local Authority. This plan sets out what steps we will take to reduce the risk of public Nuisance inside and outside the premises. This plan will be subject to regular Review by the premises and the local authority, specifically environmental health. Any alcohol sold from the premises for use off the premises, will be marked in such a way that it can be identified as being sold by Tiki Bar Itd.
- 19. No person under the age of 16 shall be permitted in the premises at any time unless accompanied by an adult. No person under the age of 18 shall be permitted on the premises after 2100 even if accompanied by an adult. All staff shall be trained and confident in the Ask Angela campaign and challenge 25. If there is any concern about the safeguarding of children, we shall immediately notify the police.
- 20. All staff and contractors shall undertake a DBS.
