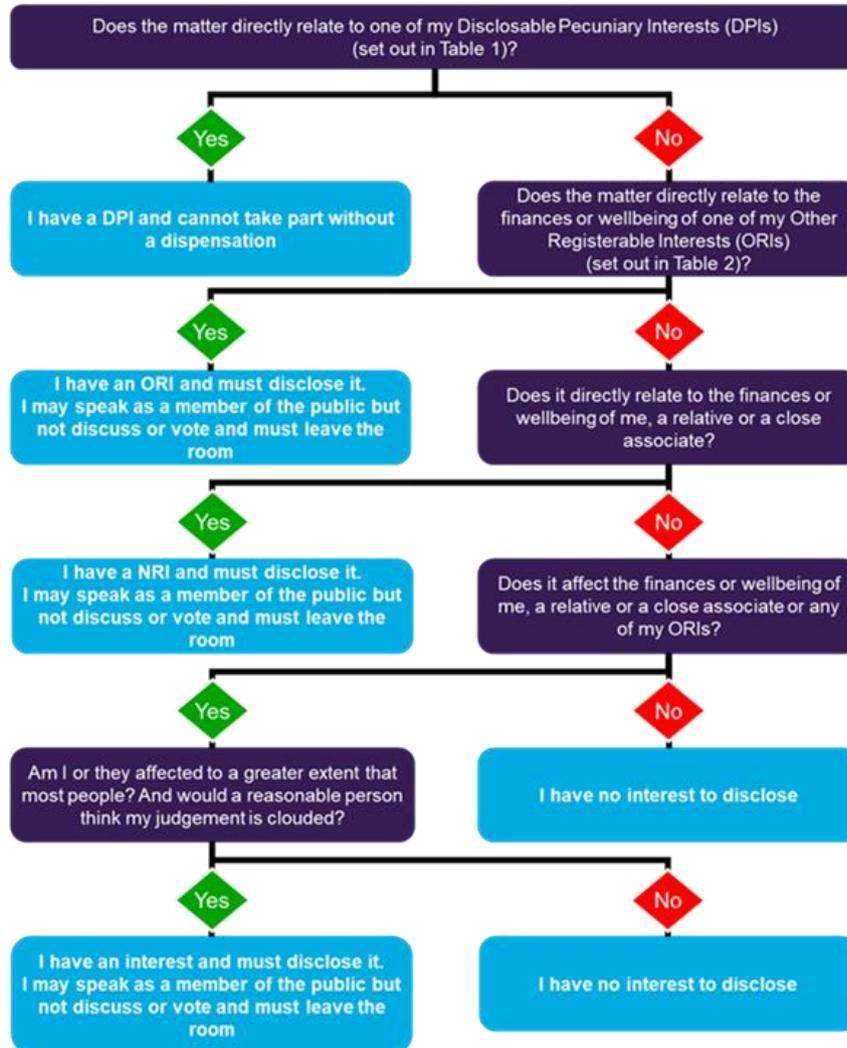


Maintaining and promoting high standards of conduct

Declaring interests at meetings

Familiarise yourself with the Councillor Code of Conduct which can be found in Part 6 of the Council's Constitution.

Before the meeting, read the agenda and reports to see if the matters to be discussed at the meeting concern your interests



What are the principles of bias and pre-determination and how do they affect my participation in the meeting?

Bias and predetermination are common law concepts. If they affect you, your participation in the meeting may call into question the decision arrived at on the item.

Bias Test

In all the circumstances, would it lead a fair minded and informed observer to conclude that there was a real possibility or a real danger that the decision maker was biased?

Predetermination Test

At the time of making the decision, did the decision maker have a closed mind?

If a councillor appears to be biased or to have predetermined their decision, they must NOT participate in the meeting.

Selflessness

Councillors should act solely in terms of the public interest

Integrity

Councillors must avoid placing themselves under any obligation to people or organisations that might try inappropriately to influence them in their work. They should not act or take decisions in order to gain financial or other material benefits for themselves, their family, or their friends. They must declare and resolve any interests and relationships

Objectivity

Councillors must act and take decisions impartially, fairly and on merit, using the best evidence and without discrimination or bias

Accountability

Councillors are accountable to the public for their decisions and actions and must submit themselves to the scrutiny necessary to ensure this

Openness

Councillors should act and take decisions in an open and transparent manner. Information should not be withheld from the public unless there are clear and lawful reasons for so doing

Honesty & Integrity

Councillors should act with honesty and integrity and should not place themselves in situations where their honesty and integrity may be questioned

Leadership

Councillors should exhibit these principles in their own behaviour. They should actively promote and robustly support the principles and be willing to challenge poor behaviour wherever it occurs

5. Application for a Premises Licence at Bournemouth Food Market, 82 Old Christchurch Road, Bournemouth, BH1 1LR

TLT Solicitors has made an application on behalf of Bournemouth Food Market Ltd for a new premises licence for a food market located at 82 Old Christchurch Road Bournemouth, BH1 1LR.

The application seeks permission for the on and off sales of alcohol between 12:00 and 22:00 every day of the week.

The application attracted 1 representation from 1 other person on the grounds that to grant the application would undermine the prevention of crime and disorder, prevention of public nuisance, public safety and protection of children from harm licensing objectives.

This matter is brought to the Licensing Sub Committee for determination.

No other items of business can be considered unless the Chair decides the matter is urgent for reasons that must be specified and recorded in the Minutes.

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LICENSING COMMITTEE AND SUB COMMITTEE – PROTOCOL FOR PUBLIC SPEAKING

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This protocol for public speaking applies to Licensing Committee and Sub Committee hearings in relation to matters including the licensing of alcohol, regulated entertainment, late night refreshment, gambling, sex establishments and hackney carriage and private hire drivers, vehicles and operators, as set out in Part 3.3 of the Council's Constitution.
- 1.2 These matters are considered in accordance with relevant legislation and associated regulations including the Licensing Act 2003 (as amended by the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011), the Gambling Act 2005, Part II and Schedule 3 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 (as amended by Section 27 of the Policing and Crime Act 2009) and the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976.

2. Conduct of Hearings

- 2.1 Chair welcomes everyone, matters of general housekeeping are dealt with, notification that the hearing may be recorded for live and subsequent broadcast on the Council's website, reminder to switch mobile phones to silent, etc.
- 2.2 Chair asks everyone present to introduce themselves and state their role.
- 2.3 Chair checks that all persons who have given notice of their intention to speak and any person who wishes to withdraw a representation or wishes not to speak have been identified.
- 2.4 Chair explains proposed procedure and order of speaking for hearing as set out in Appendix A or B of this protocol as appropriate. All parties confirm agreement or make representations on procedure proposed.
- 2.5 Licensing Officer's report is presented.
- 2.6 Parties speak in the order agreed.
- 2.7 With the exception of hackney carriage and private hire hearings, parties who are speaking should not repeat the information which they have already given in writing in their representation. They will be able to expand on the written information given, provided the information remains relevant. Any additional information should be limited to the grounds of their representation(s). For example, if they are objecting on the grounds of Public Nuisance, then they should confine their comments to matters relating to Public Nuisance.

- 2.8 Members of the Licensing Committee or Sub Committee may ask questions after each party has spoken and once all parties have spoken. Parties will be allowed to ask questions through the Chair.
- 2.9 Once all parties have been heard, the parties will be given the opportunity to sum up. Party who spoke first to go last. The hearing will then conclude.
- 2.10 Members will deliberate in private with the clerk and legal representative as appropriate present.
- 2.11 The decision will be taken by the Committee and notification of the decision will be given as follows:
 - 2.11.1 For Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005 hearings, determination must be within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held in accordance with the relevant Regulations, unless otherwise specified (for example, the issuing of a counter notice following objection to a TEN, in which case the determination must be at the conclusion of the hearing).
 - 2.11.2 For Sex Establishment and other hearings, where possible determination will be within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held.
 - 2.11.3 For Hackney Carriage and Private Hire hearings, notification of the decision will be given at the conclusion of the hearing, followed by a written decision letter where possible within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held.
- 2.12 Notification of the decision will include information for all parties of any right of appeal as appropriate.

3 General points

- 3.1 Hearings convened under the Licensing Act 2003 and the Gambling Act 2005 and associated regulations may be held remotely as required, if the Chairman agrees it is expedient to do so in the circumstances.
- 3.2 The hearing may be adjourned at any time at the discretion of the Members.
- 3.3 Members may amend the procedure at any time if they consider it to be in the public interest or in the interest of a fair hearing.
- 3.4 The Sub Committee may decide to conduct all or part of a hearing in non-public session in accordance with the relevant Regulations and/or where exempt information is likely to be disclosed.

- 3.5 The Chair may exclude any person from a hearing for being disruptive.
- 3.6 Meetings of the Licensing Committee in public session are recorded by the Council for live and subsequent broadcast on its website.
- 3.7 The hearing will take the form of a discussion.
- 3.8 Only persons (or their representatives) who have made an application, are subject to an application or have submitted a written representation or objection to the Licensing Authority under the relevant Act are permitted to speak at the hearing.
- 3.9 Any further information to support an application, representation, objection or notice (as applicable) can be submitted before the hearing. It may only be submitted at the hearing with the consent of all parties in accordance with any relevant Regulations. Wherever possible the Licensing Authority encourages parties to submit information at the earliest opportunity to allow sufficient time for this to be considered before the hearing and avoid the need for adjournment.
- 3.10 If a party has informed the Authority that they do not intend to participate, or be represented at the hearing, or has failed to advise whether they intend to participate or not, the hearing may proceed in their absence.
- 3.11 For other matters which are the responsibility of the Licensing Committee and not included in this protocol, the Meeting Procedure Rules in Part 4D of the Council's Constitution in relation to public questions, statements and petitions shall apply. This includes such matters as making recommendations on relevant licensing policies, approving the level of fees charged by the Council, and making decisions on tariffs charged by the Public Carriage Trade.

Appendix A

Proposed procedure and order of speaking for hearings (other than hackney carriage and private hire hearings)

1. The Licensing Officer presents report.
2. Questions of the Licensing Officer on their report. Members of the Sub-Committee to go first, then the applicant/licence holder.
3. Applicant will make their Application.
4. Questions of the Applicant by all parties, Members of the Committee/Sub-Committee to go first.
5. Responsible Authorities and Other Persons will make their representations.
6. Questions of the Responsible Authorities and Other Persons. Members of the Committee/Sub-Committee to go first.
7. All parties will be given an opportunity to sum up (with the party who spoke last to go first). The hearing will then conclude.
8. Sub-Committee will deliberate in private with Legal Adviser and Clerk present. (Councillors new to Licensing may observe but will not take part in the decision making).
9. Notification of the Sub Committee's decision will be given in accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Act and Gambling Act regulations. For other hearings, where possible determination will be within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held.
10. The notification of decision will include information about the right of appeal as appropriate.

Appendix B

Proposed procedure and order of speaking for Hackney Carriage and Private Hire hearings

1. The Licensing Officer presents their report.
2. Questions of the Licensing Officer on their report. Members of the Sub-Committee to go first, then the applicant/licence holder.
3. Applicant/licence holder presents their case.
4. Questions of the applicant/licence holder by all parties, Members of the Committee/Sub-Committee to go first.
5. All parties will be given an opportunity to sum up (with the party who spoke last to go first). The Hearing will then conclude.
6. Sub-Committee will deliberate in private with Legal Adviser and Clerk present. (Councillors new to Licensing may observe deliberations but will not take part in the decision making).
7. Notification of the decision will be given following deliberations at the conclusion of the hearing, to be followed by a written decision letter where possible within the period of five working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held.
8. The Legal Adviser will advise parties of any right of appeal as appropriate at the conclusion of the Hearing. Information about the right of appeal as appropriate will also be included in the written decision letter.

Executive summary	<p>TLT Solicitors has made an application on behalf of Bournemouth Food Market Ltd for a new premises licence for a food market located at 82 Old Christchurch Road Bournemouth, BH1 1LR.</p> <p>The application seeks permission for the on and off sales of alcohol between 12:00 and 22:00 every day of the week.</p> <p>The application attracted 1 representation from 1 other person on the grounds that to grant the application would undermine the prevention of crime and disorder, prevention of public nuisance, public safety and protection of children from harm licensing objectives.</p>
Recommendations	<p>It is RECOMMENDED that:</p> <p>a) Grant the application for a premises licence as made;</p> <p>b) Refuse the application for a premises licence;</p> <p>c) Grant the premises licence subject to additional conditions.</p> <p>Members of the Licensing Sub-Committee are asked to make a decision at the end of the hearing after all relevant parties have been given the opportunity to speak.</p> <p>Members must give full reasons for their decision.</p>
Reason for recommendations	<p>The Licensing Authority may only consider aspects relevant to the application that have been raised in the representation.</p> <p>Where representations have been received from a responsible authority or any other person, and the concerns have not been resolved through mediation between all parties, the Scheme of Delegation set out in the Council's Constitution states that these applications should be dealt with by the Licensing Sub-Committee.</p> <p><u>Section 182 Guidance – Public Safety</u></p> <p>Paragraph 2.8 of the Section 182 Guidance states: <i>Licence holders have a responsibility to ensure the safety of those using their</i></p>

premises, as a part of their duties under the 2003 Act. This concerns the safety of people using the relevant premises rather than public health which is addressed in other legislation. Physical safety includes the prevention of accidents and injuries and other immediate harms that can result from alcohol consumption such as unconsciousness or alcohol poisoning.

Paragraph 2.15 further advises that:

Licence holders should make provision to ensure that premises users safely leave their premises. Measures that may assist include:

- *Providing information on the premises of local taxi companies who can provide safe transportation home; and*
- *Ensuring adequate lighting outside the premises, particularly on paths leading to and from the premises and in car parks.*

Section 182 Guidance – Prevention of Public Nuisance

Public nuisance is addressed at paragraph 2.20 of the Guidance stating –

“The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.”

Paragraph 2.24 continues to state –

“Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.”

Section 182 Guidance – Protection of Children from Harm

Paragraph 2.27 states that:

	<p><i>The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly with alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives (for example, in the context of exposure to certain films or adult entertainment). Licensing authorities must also consider the need to protect children from sexual exploitation when undertaking licensing functions.</i></p>

Background

1. An Application was made by TLT Solicitors on behalf of Bournemouth Food Market Ltd, under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003, on 02 February 2026 for a premises licence to permit the on and off sales of alcohol between 12:00 and 22:00 every day of the week.
2. The premises will operate as a food market located in Bournemouth town centre.
3. A copy of the application and layout plan is attached at Appendix 1
4. A Location plan is attached at Appendix 2
5. The premises previously operated as a Pizza Hut restaurant and currently benefits from a premises licence which permits the on sale of alcohol between 10:00 and 00:00 Monday to Saturday and between 12:00 and 23:30 on Sunday. It also permits late-night refreshment between 23:00 and 00:30 Monday to Saturday and between 23:00 and 00:00 on Sunday.
6. Although Pizza Hut ceased trading at the site in 2012, the premises licence remains active and is held by the property management company responsible for the building. While it would have been possible for the applicant to submit transfer and full variation applications to update the plan and to add or amend conditions to reflect the requirements of the proposed new operation the applicant instead decided to submit a new application.
7. A copy of the current Premises Licence is shown at Appendix 3

Consultation

8. The application was served on all responsible authorities. The applicant confirmed that the statutory notices were displayed on site and published in the local newspaper.
9. Representations were received from 1 other person on the grounds that to grant the application would undermine the prevention of crime and disorder, prevention of public nuisance, public Safety and protection of children from harm licencing objectives.
10. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix 4.

11. Trading Standards have engaged in mediation with the applicant and reached agreement on the following conditions, which will be attached to the licence should it be granted:

- Challenge 25, shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are (recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence or passport I Holographically marked PASS scheme identification cards). Appropriate signage advising customers of the policy shall prominently displayed in the premises
- A refusals register will be kept at the premises and used to record any refusals of sales of alcohol (e.g. no ID/ underage/ drunk). The register will be signed off and dated by the Designated Premises Supervisor on a weekly basis as being an accurate record.
- All staff must receive training regarding the: - - Four licensing principles contained in the Licensing Act 2003 - Responsible retailing of alcohol, and the law and The conditions attached to the premises licence. Training must include evidence that the trainee has gained knowledge and understanding of the training, which may consist of a test or quiz, completed by the trainee. Documented records of training completed shall be kept for each member of staff for a minimum of 12 months and signed off by a supervisor.

12. Dorset Police Drug and Alcohol Harm Reduction team have also engaged in mediation with the applicant and reached agreement on the following conditions, which will be attached to the licence should it be granted:

- No single cans or bottles of beer or cider shall be sold at the premises.
- No super-strength beer, lagers or ciders of 5.5% ABV (alcohol by volume) or above shall be sold at the premises.
- Cider shall not be sold in bottles of any type that are larger than 2.5 litres in volume
- Outside of the hours authorised for the sale of alcohol, all alcohol within the trading area is to be secured behind locked grills, locked screens or locked cabinet doors so as to prevent access to the alcohol by both customers or staff.
- There shall be no self-service, by patrons, of spirits on the premises.
- All spirits and high value alcohol products such as champagne shall only be stored behind the sales counter and shall not be directly accessible to customers.
- All staff involved in the sale of alcohol shall receive training on the law relating to prohibited sales, the age verification policy adopted by the premises and the conditions attaching to the premises licence. Refresher training shall be provided at least once every 6 months. A record shall be maintained of all staff training and that record shall be signed by the person receiving the training and the trainer. The records shall be kept for a minimum of 12 months and made available for inspection by police, licensing or other authorised officers.
- The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system, all entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is

open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the preceding 31 day period. The CCTV system should be updated and maintained according to police recommendations.

- An incident log shall be kept at the premises. The log should include the date and time of the incident and the name of the member of staff involved. The log to be made available on request to an authorised officer of the Council or the Police, which will record the following:
 - (a) all crimes reported to the venue
 - (b) all ejections of patrons
 - (c) any complaints received
 - (d) any incidents of disorder
 - (e) any faults in the CCTV system or searching equipment or scanning equipment
 - (f) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
 - (g) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

- Challenge 25, shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are (recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence or passport I Holographically marked PASS scheme identification cards). Appropriate signage advising customers of the policy shall prominently displayed in the premises.

13. No representations were received from any of the other responsible authorities.

Options Appraisal

14. Before making a decision, Members are asked to consider the following matters: -

- The representation made by an Other Person against the application.
- The relevant licensing objectives, namely the prevention of crime and disorder, prevention of public nuisance, public safety and protection of children from harm.
- The Licensing Act 2003 and appropriate Regulations.
- Statutory Revised Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 (February 2026) and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.

On 26 November 2025 the guidance was updated to clarify licensing authority discretion (case-by-case decisions).

A spokesperson for the Home Office said:

“The update to the Section 182 Guidance has been added to help ensure that, when determining licence applications and considering any conditions that may apply, Licensing Authorities have in mind the need to support the development of a thriving hospitality sector while still upholding the existing statutory licensing objectives.

The new line in the guidance is 1.18, when making licensing decisions, all licensing authorities should consider the need to promote growth and deliver economic benefits”.

Summary of financial implications

15. An appeal may be made against the decision of the Sub-Committee, by the applicant or any party making representation, to the Magistrates' Court which could have a financial impact on the Council.

Summary of legal implications

16. If Members decide to refuse the application or attach conditions to the licence which the applicant, or the other person who made a representation do not agree to, the applicant or such other person may appeal to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the day that the applicant is notified, in writing, of the decision.

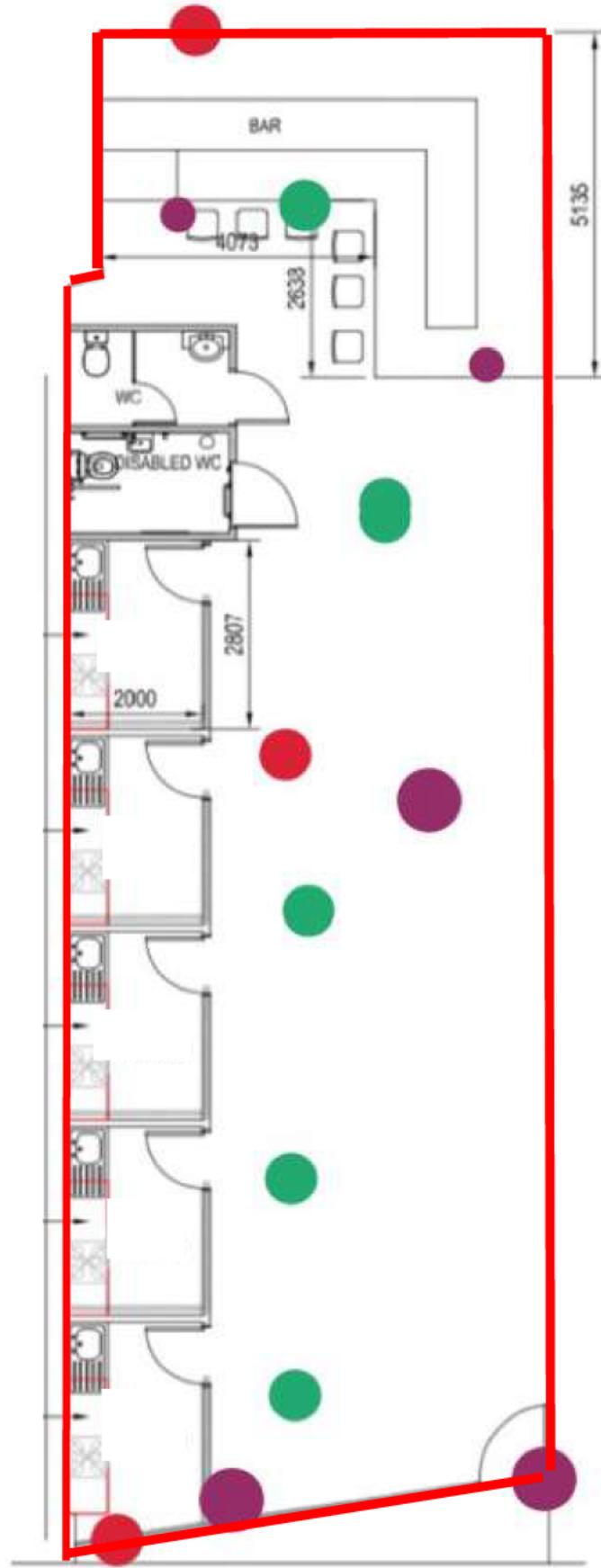

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

Mandatory Conditions (Sections 19,20,21 LA2003)

- 1.1 There shall be no sale or supply of alcohol when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of this premises licence or at a time when the said premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or when his/her licence is suspended.
- 1.2 Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) (Amendment) Order 2014

- 1.3 (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises-
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 1.4 The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 1.5 (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either-
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.

1.6 The responsible person must ensure that-

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-
 - (i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Conditions) Order 2014

- 1.7
1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 -
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
 - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
 - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence-
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
 4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Mandatory Conditions - (Embedded Restrictions) - Attached as part of Conversion Application under Transitional Grandfather Rights Restaurants/Hotels

- 1.8 The abovementioned restrictions on the times permitted to sell alcohol do not prohibit the supply to, or consumption by, any person of alcohol in any premises where they are residing.
- 1.9 The abovementioned restrictions on the times permitted to sell alcohol do not prohibit the sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club.
- 1.10 The abovementioned restrictions on the times permitted to sell alcohol do not prohibit the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of persons so supplied.
- 1.11 The abovementioned restrictions on the times permitted to sell alcohol do not prohibit the supply of alcohol for consumption on premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the businesses carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.
- 1.12 The abovementioned restrictions on the times permitted to sell alcohol do not prohibit the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces.
- 1.13 Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:
 - 1.13.1 With and for the consumption at a meal supplied at the same time, consumed with the meal and paid for together with the meal;
 - 1.13.2 For consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together with his accommodation;
 - 1.13.3 To a canteen or mess.
- 1.14 The consumption of any alcohol supplied shall be consumed by the end of the first thirty minutes after the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol.
- 1.15 No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:
 - 1.15.1 He is the child of the holder of the premises licence;
 - 1.15.2 He resides in the premises, but is not employed there;
 - 1.15.3 He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress;
 - 1.15.4 The bar is in premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.

1.16 The licensee shall have regard and comply with any relevant provisions of the following enactments during any licensable activities taking place on the premises:

1.16.1 Children and Young Persons Act 1933

1.16.2 Cinematograph (Safety) Regulations 1955

1.16.3 Sporting Events (Control of Alcohol Etc) Act 1985

Conditions on Justices Liquor Licence - Attached as Part of Conversion Application under Transitional Grandfather Rights

1.17 Intoxicating liquor shall not be sold or supplied on the premises otherwise than to persons taking table meals there and for consumption by such a person as ancillary to his meal.

1.18 Suitable beverages other than intoxicating liquor (including drinking water) shall be equally available for consumption with or otherwise as an ancillary to meals served in the premises.

1.19 The premises are structurally adapted and bona fide used for the purpose of habitually providing for the accommodation of persons frequenting the premises, substantial refreshment, to which the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor is ancillary.

Dear Licensing Team,

I write to make a **formal objection** to this premises licence application for "Bournemouth Food Market, 82 Old Christchurch Road, Bournemouth, BH1 1LR".

I strongly oppose the grant of an alcohol licence for this proposed food market. In my view, the application presents a clear risk to the licensing objectives and should be **refused**.

Prevention of public nuisance

A venue of this type will inevitably generate substantial noise, disturbance, and disruption, particularly in the evenings and at closing time. This will not be limited to noise inside the premises, but will extend to customers arriving, leaving, smoking, congregating outside, raising their voices, and dispersing into the surrounding area. Once an alcohol-led element is introduced, these problems become significantly harder to control. Any suggestion that this can be fully managed by conditions alone is, in my opinion, unrealistic.

Prevention of crime and disorder

The sale of alcohol in a busy multi-operator food market environment creates an obvious risk of drunkenness, anti-social behaviour, confrontation, nuisance behaviour, and wider disorder in the surrounding area. These types of venues attract high footfall and long dwell times, and the addition of alcohol materially increases the risk of incidents both inside and outside the premises. Local residents and nearby businesses should not be expected to bear that risk.

Public safety

There are serious concerns about the practical management of customer numbers, queuing, dispersal, supervision, and the handling of intoxicated persons. If this licence is granted, the impact will not stop at the entrance doors. It will affect the immediate vicinity and place additional pressure on the surrounding area. I do not believe the application provides sufficient reassurance that these risks have been properly addressed.

Protection of children from harm

It is wholly inappropriate for children and families in the area to be exposed to the

consequences of a licensed venue of this nature, including raised voices, intoxicated behaviour, foul language, and late-evening disturbance. Granting this application risks normalising precisely the kind of environment that the licensing regime is meant to control.

More broadly, the application does not, in my view, provide convincing or robust detail as to how the licensing objectives will actually be upheld in practice. General assurances are not enough. The likely real-world effect of this licence would be increased nuisance, increased disorder risk, and a negative impact on those living, working, or passing nearby.

For those reasons, I respectfully submit that this application should be **refused in full**.

If, despite these objections, the Licensing Authority is nevertheless minded to grant the application, then I would ask that the matter be subjected to the strictest possible scrutiny and conditions. However, my position is that the application should not be granted.
