Disability The proposed changes impact all service users, however blue badge holders will not be impacted on-street due to the free parking their blue badge entitles them to; off-street all disabled tax-exempt vehicle (DTEV) permit holders are able to park for free; there is no proposed increase to DTEV parking permit charges. All payment options through the cashless mobile phone and car park Pay & Display machines remain available. To maintain access to parking the Blue Badge and Parent and Child bays are actively monitored by the enforcement team and PCNs issued to any unauthorised vehicles. All beach areas are serviced by public buses with provision for priority users such as wheelchairs and pushchairs. Socio-economic status In summer 2021 66569 people used the King's Park park and ride. The park and ride will be operational again this summer providing a cheaper more environmentally sustainable modes of transport helping to reduce congestion and improve air quality costing £5 to park and free travel. Beryl bikes and electric scooters are available at locations throughout BCP and at all seafronts locations. Discounted parking permits are available for both residents and non-residents. Free parking is also available within walking distance in some unrestricted on-street parking areas.

	As demonstrated by the 2021 usage figures the requirement for a Park and Ride service from Poole is extremely low and as such will not be continued this year. The Kings Park park and ride will be operational again this summer providing a cheaper more environmentally sustainable modes of transport helping to reduce congestion and improve air quality costing £5 per vehicle to park and free travel.
	Discounted parking permits are available for both residents and non-residents.

	All aspects of the council's summer readiness plan will be reviewed in the autumn and used to make informed changes to the following years provision.
Summary of Equality Implications:	The proposed changes impact all service users, however blue badge holders will not be impacted on-street due to the free parking their blue badge entitle them to; off-street all disabled taxexempt vehicle (DTEV) permit holders are able to park for free; there is no proposed increase to DTEV parking permits. Priority Blue Badge and parent and Child bays are regularly patrolled to deter and prevent improper use and help identify any changes required in the provision. The 10% in parking charge increase will likely have a minor negative impact on some low socio-economic groups this can be mitigated by the use of cheaper more sustainable modes of transport are available such as the park and ride charged at £5 per vehicle and through the council's Beryl bike and electric scooter provision. The use of public transport and more sustainable modes of transport will help to contribute to a reduction in congestion improving air quality for residents and visitors.
