## Background

1. This report sets out the appointment of members to Outside Bodies for approval by Council.
2. The Local Authorities (Functions and Responsibilities) (England) Regulations 2000 identifies functions which may be the responsibility of an authority's executive.

3. Part 3 Paragraph 10.2 of the Councils Constitution identifies these functions and indicates whether the function is an executive or non-executive function.
4. The appointment to Outside Bodies is one of the functions which is identified as a non-executive function and therefore requires approval from Council.
5. Part 3 Paragraph 10.2 reads as follows: -

15.	<p>The appointment of any individual—</p> <p>(a) to any office other than an office in which he is employed by the authority;</p> <p>(b) to any body other than—</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">(i) the authority;</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">(ii) a joint committee of two or more authorities; or</p> <p>(c) to any committee or sub-committee of such a body, and the revocation of any such appointment</p>	Non-executive
